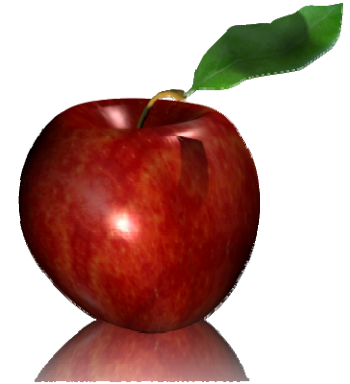

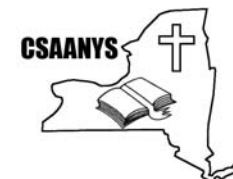

Faculty and Staff

Our Catholic Identity: This interactive workshop will encompass evaluating current practices, developing goals and creating a plan for enhancing the Catholic identity of the school.

Sharing our Faith: Participants will discuss ways to incorporate the Catholic teachings in any setting. Outside the box thinking coupled with sharing experiences will provide teachers with a new level of comfort for sharing their faith.

How to deal with parents who are in a variety of emotional states: Learn communication strategies, ways to build parental support, and ideas for keeping your relationships on target.

Internet Literacy: In this hands-on computer lab workshop designed to teach faculty tools that they, in turn, can teach students. Learn the ins and outs of the Internet, how to conduct effective and efficient searches, learn the hidden secrets, and find out where missing web pages went.

Copyright and Fair use: Teachers set the example for students. Often there are questions about what can be used, downloaded or copied for classrooms use. This workshop will detail the law and explain fair use.

Web 2.0: Learn to use Web 2.0 tools to enhance the learning experience for students. All of the tools can be used in grades K-12.

Cyberbullying/Internet Safety: Bullying has taken on a new and frightening form. Learn how to talk to kids, what to look for, how to talk to

parents, and gather resources to combat this very real, and very scary form of bullying.

Meet Mr. and Mrs. Gen X: Today's parents are a new "breed" so to speak. This workshop will give strategies for dealing with the customer service expectations, parents who are self-interested and maneuver with stealth like fighter tactics.

Mandated reporter refresher: With the changes in the Mandated reporter law in 2007 a refresher course on what teacher obligations are, how administrators can help, and basic information about abuse and neglect is important for all faculty members.

Effective Communication: Hone your communication skills, and understand why what you say may not be "heard". Learn how personalities determine how we communicate with each other. Become a champion communicator!

Students

Cyberbullying/Internet Safety: Students need to learn how to be safe on the Internet as well as understand that cyberbullying is not accepted behavior and it is not anonymous.

Social Justice: In this interactive workshop students discuss social justice issues, research areas of need, and develop action plans to bring about change.



Parents

Cyberbullying/Internet Safety: Learn how children are using the Internet. Get "up to speed" with the tools youth find interesting. Get information and resources to combat the very real threat of cyberbullying. Learn how to talk to kids, what to look for, and how to gather resources to combat this very real, form of bullying.

Web 2.0: This is a hands-on workshop for people interested in learning and exploring the sites today's youth are using. Participants will learn about blogging, wikis, social networking sites, chat rooms, instant messaging, and much more.

10 Commandments for Parents: This talk explores how parents can be partners with teachers in educating children. Topics such as: sleep, activities, dealing with consequences, and encouraging effort will be explored.

Raising Children of Character: How do we raise responsible adults? Whose job is it to instill character? What is character anyway? These and many more questions will be examined.
